Discussion Notes:

Augustin welcomed all attendees with a round of introductions. Then began the meeting with a land acknowledgment and safety moment, followed by a review of open and ongoing action items from previous meetings.

Augustin shared details about the upcoming Mid-Term Review Meeting with Canadian Nuclear Safety Commission (CNSC), noting that the CNSC is holding a public meeting the week of May 25, 2026, in Peterborough and/or virtually, where BWXT and CNSC staff will provide a mid-term update on licensed activities at the Toronto and Peterborough facilities. Augustin shared that BWXT holds two separate Class IB licenses, both of which expire December 31, 2030, and noted the mid-term update will cover the first five years of the 10-year licensing period for both facilities. Augustin highlighted the opportunity for public participation and encouraged CLC members to submit an intervention before the deadline of April 17, 2026. She shared that BWXT has a dedicated page on the nec.bwxt.com website focused on this meeting and noted that BWXT developed a community briefing document which is available as well. CLC Member Santano asked what Class IB Licence means. Duarte shared this is the type of licence BWXT has from the CNSC, noting it is for nuclear substance processing facilities.

Next, Augustin provided an update on community engagement efforts, sharing some recent engagements in the community: Met in person with Six Nations of the Grand River in January, provided a donation to Spinal Cord Injury Ontario for their community programs, and provided a donation to Oasis Dufferin Community Centre for toiletry products. Augustin then shared that the fence banners that were installed last year were removed due to the wind from the previous storm, sharing that for safety reasons permanent banners will likely not be installed there in the future. Augustin noted that BWXT is reviewing alternative options (digital screens around the city, bus shelters or bus advertisements) and asked CLC members for recommendations.

Augustin then recapped the recent Community Connect Information Event at The Primrose (2 Primrose Avenue) on March 5 from 4:00-7:00 p.m., sharing this was an opportunity for the company to connect with community members, answer questions, and share information about the upcoming mid-term meeting. She shared that a multipronged approach was used to invite community such as print mailers, social media advertisements, Facebook Group posts, and email invitations and noted that nine attendees joined, all staying between 10-20 minutes. She continued to share that the attendees had many questions and good discussions occurred. All attendees found out about the event from BWXT's mailer and email update, and three attendees signed up for BWXT's mailing list and expressed interest in a tour. Augustin noted that BWXT would be holding another event this year and asked for feedback and recommendations, highlighting the company is considering a

booth/table at Dufferin Mall. CLC member Rankin shared Galleria Mall and Joseph J. Piccini community centre would both be good options as well.

Next, Augustin thanked CLC members for all the feedback provided during the website review session last year. She shared that many updates were made to the website as a result of this feedback, including, updates to the Environment and Safety section to more clearly link to all the sub-pages (i.e. radiation and uranium, monitoring and reports, emergency response, regulatory compliance, etc.), including a link to more information about the Fuel Handling and nuclear medicine projects at the facility, and continuing to share information about community engagement efforts. Augustin shared that BWXT is working with the Brand/Marketing department to determine the best approach to updating environmental tables on the website to include additional limits and confirmed that the bwxt.com parent website does link to the nec.bwxt.com dedicated website. CLC Member Rankin noted that including other data reference points to help contextualize the emissions would be helpful for community members to understand the data.

Augustin then brought up the apartment complex at 980 Lansdowne, sharing that BWXT has been connected with the developer since 2022 to request ongoing updates about occupancy, determine when a property manager would be assigned, and ensure they and future tenants know about BWXT's operations. She also noted that BWXT got in touch with the real estate agent in 2024. Augustin shared that BWXT has worked on our profiles via Google, Apple and Bing maps to ensure BWXT is visible on maps for potential renters, increased community mailing and targeted social media advertisements (new neighbours would receive these items), added fence banners to showcase what we do/operate safely/contact information, and noted that once a property manager is identified and tenants move in, BWXT wants to coordinate an information session. Augustin asked if the CLC knew any more information about this complex. CLC Member Rankin shared that it appears some of the buildings further from the BWXT facility look to have occupancy on the first few floors. Duffy shared that the city has installed traffic lights but that they are not running yet. CLC Member Santano explained that new neighbours are constantly moving into the neighbourhood and noted that it makes sense that people do not know what BWXT does because of high turnover. He continued to note that he has lived in the neighbourhood for over thirty years and is not concerned. CLC Member Dr. G. Sepczynska shared that people are not as engaged and highlighted that safety earns trust. CLC Member Moroz highlighted that the facility and industrial space was there long before all the housing.

Augustin then asked CLC members to share feedback and suggestions for discussion topics and community engagement. CLC Member Rankin asked what social media BWXT uses. Augustin shared that BWXT uses Meta (primarily through Facebook and Instagram advertisements and a dedicated BWXT Facebook Group).

The meeting concluded with a review of upcoming meeting dates.
